ith only fifteen months left before the Botswana nation celebrate the Vision 2016, the Vision 2016 Council held its second National Stakeholder Conference and Exhibition which was conducted under the theme "The journey so far: In Pursuit of prosperity for all by 2016" which took place at fairgrounds in Gaborone. The first Conference was in May 2004 and was officially opened by the former president Dr. Festus Mogae under the theme "Vision 2016: Where are we?".


The National Stakeholder Conference and Exhibition ran from the 28th July to the 30th July 2015. It attracted participation from public sector, private sector and civil society, trade unions and the media. The focal point of this conference was to reflect on the journey which started in 1996 when the government of Botswana and its people set goals to achieve by 2016. They discussed all pillars of Vision 2016; the success and challenges faced in each pillar. When officially opening the 2015 Conference His Honour The Vice President Mokgweetsi Masisi said he was happy because the celebration of Vision 2016 will take place in the year in which Botswana will be celebrating 50 years of independence and this will add value to the celebrations. He further said significant progress has been achieved across seven

pillars of vision 2016. When talking about the pillar of 'An Educated and Informed Nation', Masisi said universal access to education with primary School Net Enrolment Rate reached 93.1% in 2013 while Adult literacy rates improved from 69% in 1993 to 84.1% in 2009.

Presenting on the pillar of 'An Educated, An Informed Nation' the Deputy Chairperson of the pillar, BEC's Corporate Communications Manager Ms. Fingile Makgalemele said a lot of strides have been achieved in the education sector since 1996. She further went on to underscore the importance and the involvement of all the relevant stakeholders in the education sector, citing it as one way to achieve good results for Vision2016 pillar of An Educated, An Informed Nation. On the last day of the conference former Vice President Dr P. H. Kedikilwe toured the conference exhibition stalls where BEC took part as one of the drivers of An Educated, An Informed Nation pillar. The BEC Corporate Communications Officers educated the public about the Council's mandate and services. Botswana Examinations Council (BEC) in Collaboration with the Ministry of Education and Skills Development (MoESD) have for the sixth consecutive year awarded prizes to excelling students in basic education national examinations. Students from PSLE, JCE and BGCSE were on the 16th of July honoured for their outstanding performances in the 2014 examinations.

The Annual Excellence Awards are a Corporate Social Investment by BEC in partnership with the parent ministry; MoESD. BEC and MoESD initiated these awards in an effort to help improve academic performance at national examinations level and to inspire upcoming generations to put more effort in their studies so that they also make it to the Excellence Awards podium by doing exceptionally well in their final examinations.

Speaking at the ceremony the guest of honour, His Excellency Lt Gen. Seretse Khama Ian Khama implored awards recipients to be pacesetters not only in academic excellence but positive attitude and behaviour. "I take it that awards recipients here today are a testimony that they have overcome the challenges that others succumb to while in school and it is my sincere hope that they continue to be exemplary in the next phase of their schooling", he said. President Khama further advised that discipline should be embodied early, at home, at school and at the workplace.

For her part the Minister of Education and Skills development Hon. Dr. Unity Dow while delivering her remarks, challenged the award recipients to invest more time in reading and writing as this practice will help not only to polish their writing skills but will equip them with knowledge.

A total of thirty six students (36) from four (4) categories received awards. The recipients included students from PSLE, JCE and BGCSE. The categories were sponsored by Incredible Connections, Dimension Data, Stanbic Bank and Orange Botswana.

The overall winner Dimpho Gosenyang from Naledi Senior Secondary School walked away with a P20 000.00 cheque, Mater Spei College's Nonofo Maikano took home P10 000.00 for finishing second and Shato Willie of St Josephs College bagged P5 000.00 in third position.

Uncollected Certificates A Concern

n academic certificate is a very important document, not only for the obvious reasons of helping one progress academically or seek employment. This official document is tangible proof that one has successfully completed another milestone in life, never mind the results.

Botswana Examinations Council (BEC) conducts and administers three examinations; PSLE, JCE and BGCSE after which they issue certificates for these three examinations. Despite the importance of these certificates BEC is worried by a growing trend of people not collecting their certificates. Certification supervisor Ms. Tapologo Ditshego says they have many uncollected certificates in their possession from previous academic years. "People do not seem to appreciate the value of having their certificates until they have reasons forcing them to come collect them", expressed Ditshego. She said they register an influx of people coming to collect their certificates usually when tertiary institutions and vocational colleges call for applications for further studies, and when institutions that employ in large numbers like the BDF start their recruitment processes.

Ditshego also expressed concern on the escalating number of people who lose or

misplace their certificates after collecting them. She further noted that in some instances people claim to have lost their certificates while this is untrue and have a Certifying Statement issued to them. She warned that this is illegal as they go under oath and sign affidavits to confirm that they have lost their original certificates.

Certificates are issued several months after the results have been published and in the interim, a statement of results is issued to candidates while awaiting their certificates. However a statement of results is a provincial document and immediately becomes null and void once the certificates are printed. "Some people make copies of statements of results and use them continuously without coming for their certificates, but this is wrong," Ditshego warned.

All certificates are sent to schools where candidates sat for their examinations for collection, failing which after two years all certificates are recalled to BEC for safe storage. This poses a threat to storage space. Not collecting certificates puts candidates at a disadvantage as some of them will have to travel hundreds of kilometres to BEC offices in Gaborone to collect certificates. Private candidates collect their certificates from BEC offices at Plot 54864, KT Motsete Rd.

Botswana Examinations Council hosted The Director at CITO Institute for Educational Measurement, Mr. Jan Weigers for a public lecture on e-assessment entitled E-Assessment, Innovations for the 21st Century.

Based in Arnhem, The Netherlands CITO is one of the world's leading testing and assessment institutions. It was founded in 1968 by the Dutch government. CITO serves both the public and the business community. Although best known as one of the leading makers of tests and examinations, CITO also develops monitoring and evaluation systems, conducts research into performance levels and measurement, and assists with a wide range of training programmes. In addition to serving many groups, organisations and individuals in the Netherlands, CITO acts as an advisor to the international educational community - providing advice on the introduction and modernisation of standardised

testing and examination systems, training for international educators and support for educational reform.

According to Weigers, CITO has more than 2000 freelancers who work for educational institutions, government and private companies. It has offices in Germany, USA and Turkey. Its agencies are in Japan and Korea and it has international consultancy and training in many countries such as Nigeria, Ghana, Singapore, Vietnam, Brazil, Kazakhstan, Azerbaijan, UK, and Germany.

As the focal aim of the seminar was about sharing with Batswana the benefits of computer based testing, Mr. Wiegers disclosed that it took CITO ten years to develop Questify, an E-assessment software that is now on its fifth generation version. He said through this software students are able to write any kind of examinations through computers online or offline and it has many benefits to any educational institution. Through the demonstrations that Mr. Weigers made during the lecture, he showed the tools incorporated in the software that caters for students with disabilities such as calculators with sound (for students with hearing impairment), voice (for students with reading problems or dyslexia) and magnifying glasses and symbols (for Mathematics).

When comparing Computer Based Testing (CBT) with paper written examinations Mr: Weigers said it showed that the CBT has an upper hand in producing better pass rate compared to paper written examinations. He also said it takes a shorter time for CBT to be graded and as such candidates need not to wait a long time to get their grades. He also stated that the system can eliminate a lot of assessment errors.

BEC staff, University of Botswana academics, researchers, BOCODOL, HRDC, BQA, Ministry of Education and the public attended the lecture.

he Botswana Examinations Council (BEC) took part in the 10th Botswana Anniversary Consumer fair. The Fair is an all inclusive platform whose objectives are to create an interactive forum for exhibitors and their clients. It offers opportunities for diversification of the economy and promotes service sectors.

The Botswana Consumer Fair tagline was 'Shop Discover and Explore' as the majority of the public attend the consumer fair to Shop and Discover the latest products, innovations as well as to Explore networking possibilities. BEC Implements Online Registration and Payment for Private Candidates

Botswana Examinations Council (BEC) rolled out an online registration and payment of national examinations for BGCSE private candidates for the first time in 2015. This latest development is one of the many functions that are being implemented using the Botswana National Examination Processing System (BNEPS).

According to Manager - Data Processing, Mr. Oduetse Setlhare, BEC has partnered with Orange to enable the payment of examinations fees via Orange Money. He said that to be able to register and pay online, private candidates will require Internet access, an Orange Money Account and sufficient Orange network coverage.

Setlhare said students would register for the examinations using MALEPA. The system will then issue candidates with a Provisional Statement of Entry showing; the candidate details, the amount due and the application number which the candidate will use to pay using Orange Money at an authorised outlet.

He further added that this latest development would go a long way in improving the delivery of BEC services. It will save students time and money they spend when travelling to satellite centres for their registration.

Reached for comment, Orange Money Product Manager Ms. Yvonne Abram said they were very delighted to partner with BEC to bring this service to its customers. "We have a large customer base and a number of them are students and bringing this service to them is a sign of our commitment of delivering world class services" she said. Abram further said Orange Money service is a convenient, safe and secure way of sending and receiving money, paying for services and is widely available at Orange and authorised outlets.

ith the aim of providing interactive feedback performance the on of 2014 national examinations. Botswana Examinations Council (BEC) Directorate of Research and Policy Development (RPD) recently held the information dissemination workshops across the country between the months of May to September 2015 with the last one held in Gaborone on the 1st of September 2015.

During the workshops, although appreciating the BEC efforts, participants highlighted the need to have the dissemination workshops earlier, probably in April, to give teachers enough time to prepare their students for examinations. Participants also requested that teachers should be equipped with skills on assessment issues especially item writing skills.

RDP has indicated that other recommendations which were not related to the presentations will be shared with relevant directorates or departments in BEC and the Ministry of Education and Skills Development.

The aim of the dissemination workshop was to interactively discuss the 2014 results with stakeholders for feedback and remedial purposes: to highlight the trend in performance and indicate subjects which were mostly affected by the decline in performance, to discuss the performance at subject level and marking observations and to compare the 2014 BGCSE candidates' performance in Setswana, English and Mathematics with their 2012 JCE performance.

The information dissemination workshop targeted the Ministry of Education and Skills Development (MOESD) management and its regions. Participants included but were not limited to: BEC staff, Regional Education Officers, school heads and teachers.

About 444 participants from the 8 educational regions; Kgalagadi, Kgatleng, Kweneng, Southern, North West, North East, Ghanzi, Chobe and Gaborone (Grand Dissemination) attended the workshops.

Bresource Centre has become a rather popular spot for private candidates, particularly those that are re-sitting for the BGCSE examinations.

Though its principal clientele are staff members of BEC who are allowed to borrow material that is not for reference use, it also caters for the external customers who may come to read and or study at the resource centre. It is worth noting that external clients are not allowed to borrow materials from the resources centre unless it is an Inter Library Lending.

Every year BEC receives applications from private candidates who wish to write

examinations offered by the Council. BEC therefore extended courtesy to allow students to use the resource centre to study for their examinations.

BEC Resource Centre Coordinator Ms. Gaone Pelotona said she is happy to see the number of their clientele going up and credited it to private candidates who visit during working hours. "It is pleasing to see the clientele base of the Resource Centre extending beyond the BEC," expressed Pelotona. She added that this will help the Resource Centre to grow as there is now more reason to procure more materials to conveniently cater for the increasing numbers. The Resource Centre's registration log shows a growing number of visitors especially as the examinations are getting closer; in July it registered 143 visitors, August 461 and September 737.

The Resource Centre, which is a unit under the Directorate of Research and Policy Development, offers amongst other services; Inter Library Lending, Referral Services, and WIFI. The Resource Centre has a total collection of 4184 books ranging from Text books, Periodicals, Reports, Official Reports, Fiction and Past Examinations Papers. The resource centre operating hours are from 8 am to 16:30 pmfrom Monday to Friday and it is closed on weekends and public holidays.





s the nation made a double toast to 49 years of independence and the official count down to the 50th independence in 2016, Botswana Examintions Council was also part of the jubilations. th ISO 9001:2008 certification trending in Africa Botswana Examinations Council (BEC) has committed itself to the implementation of this International Standard as a base for its Quality Management System (QMS). As a result the objectives that BEC has set for itself are to implement ISO 9001:2008 as a base for its quality management system by 2015 and to attain certification status by December 2015.

The benefits that will be realised by accomplishing these objectives include:

- Improved organisational performance and productivity
- Enhanced customer satisfaction
- Improvement in competitive position or advantage

Activities such as project planning, training of personnel, review and development of relevant documentation, conducting internal audits and certification audit need to take place in order for BEC to successfully achieve its set objectives.

One critical activity which the progress or commencement of other key activities rests on is the development of documentation. For this reason Directorates have initiated the reviewing and development of documentation.

Like any project, challenges that caused delays were met however the project managed to stay on track registering positive progress for some stages and an increase in the overall percentage completion of the project.

The project team is working with all Directorates to meet the December 2015 deadline. As W. Edwards Deming puts it "Quality is everyone's responsibility"; effective implementation of the BEC QMS is truly everyone's responsibility. All BEC teams are therefore urged to ensure that developed policies, procedures and all related guidelines are implemented and generated records are effectively maintained.

Botswana Examinations Council (BEC) Transformation Project is taking shape after its envisaged Amendment Bill was published in the 21st August 2015 Botswana Government Gazette for presentation during the November Parliament meeting.

The object of the Bill is to amend the BEC Act among others to make provision for the appointment of Board members of the Council on the basis of their competence, knowledge, and experience; remove standard four attainment tests, development and publication criteria of external qualification from the functions of the Council; make provision for the appointment of the Chief Executive Officer of the Council; and make provision for the invigilation and supervision of course work and examination.

The purpose of the transformation is to turn the organisation into a high performance national examinations and assessment authority that will drive the assessment of basic education and pretertiary technical vocational education and training aligned to the National Human Resources Development Strategy and National Credit and Qualifications Framework.

Through the 10th EDF Botswana Human Resource Development Sector Policy support programme to the Ministry of Education and Skills Development, BEC has acquired the services of a consultant Professor to assist with the development of an implementation framework for the transformation. This also includes development of a transition strategy for the functions that are being transferred to BEC.

Professor du Pré has been conducting a series of meetings with different BEC Directorates explaining about the project and answering lingering questions from employees. He is now examining the TVET environment, as the assessment of TVET in Botswana will have to be placed under BEC.

Currently, the TVET assessment is scattered across a number of ministries and institutions, and meetings with those entities to identify and arrange for the transfer of those assessment functions to BEC, are presently being held.

Change Management Plans for the project

Professor Roy du Pré has been roped to assist in BEC's transformation into a National Examinations and Assessment Authority.



Malpractice involves a deliberate act of wrongdoing, contrary to official examination rules, and is designed to place a candidate at an unfair advantage or disadvantage.

DETECTION OF MALPRACTICE

School heads, chief invigilators, invigilators, supervisors and Examination Council officials provide much of the evidence for malpractice. Evidence is also provided by candidates, parents and the public who witness malpractice, and from others disillusioned by the failure of bribed officials to deliver the expected level of support.

Examinations malpractice is a serious offence punishable by law. Any person who commits an offence shall be liable on conviction to a fine not less than P5 000.00 but not more than P8 000.00 or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding five years, or to both such fine and imprisonment.

All enquiries and reports of examinations malpractice should be reported to the Executive Secretary Botswana Examinations Council either by form of writing or in person.



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
